
Old age rational suicide A poll of UK adults








Support for legal assistance to die in the event of **terminal illness** tends to be stronger among the under 45 year olds








Support for legal assistance to die if someone **elderly** and suffering unbearably, tends to have stronger support among the over 35 year olds


Technical note (telephone research)

- A total of 1,008 interviews were completed between 4-6 March 2011 with UK adults aged 18+ (1,009 2-4 July 2010)
- Interviews were conducted by telephone and the data was collected by ICM Omnibus
- Quotas were set by age, gender and working status then weighted to achieve a representative sample of UK adults
- This report is accompanied by data tables
- The research was commissioned by the Society for Old Age Rational Suicide

Technical note (online research)

- A total of 2,024 interviews were completed between 4-6 March 2011 with UK adults aged
 18+
- Interviews were conducted online and the data was collected by ICM Omnibus from their panel of 135,000 panellists (largely recruited by telephone)
- Quotas were set by age, gender and working status then weighted to achieve a representative sample of UK adults
- The online sample profile is very similar to the telephone sample profile so it is likely that there is something about the method of data collection that is influencing the proportions who agree 'strongly. There are a couple of possibilities:
 - People are considering the moral or legal implications more carefully and moderating their views because they recognise the complexity or their own lack of understanding.
 - The lack of an interviewer removes any social pressure to give a socially desirable or morally correct answer to the interviewer
